- Monitor Food Stores and feed if needed
- Ensure entrances are open for proper ventilation
- Start to get ready for your bees which should arrive in April

WHAT TO PREPARE FOR IN APRIL

- Inspect and remove dead-outs determine cause
- Remove entrance reducers on healthy strong hives
- Be prepared to feed syrup (1:1) and pollen substitutes
- Be ready to receive packages know what is required for success





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
