What's Happening in the hive in June

Bees are expanding rapidly – watch for overcrowding. Continue to inspect every 7-10 days.- Monitor colonies for queen cells, pests, and diseases. Check brood pattern to make sure your queen is laying well. Add another super if needed. By adding a frame of brood from a strong hive to a weaker hive, you can equalize your hives.

What to prepare for in May

The gueen should be laying well now. In warmer weather the hive should be expanding rapidly. Strong over wintered bees swarm in May. Implement swarm management practices. Keep inspecting every 7 to 10 days to monitor for queen cells and control pest and diseases.

EDUCATION SPEAKER – Presentations

<u>Kaelyn Sumner</u> Pulaski FFA Student Advisor. She presented her science fair project that she will be taking to state level. Her goal was to see what impacted the glucose levels in honey, sources or location. Her work on finding glucose



levels in honey and if the levels are influenced by location or geographical area. Some of the biggest challenges were to find out the correct dilution. Thank you Kaelyn for your work and for sharing with our club. Kaelyn will participate in the State FFA Convention June 10-13 and finds out about her proficiency award on the 11th. On June 12th she also presents at the Agriscience Fair. We are thrilled to have such engaged youth in our club.
