June - WHAT IS GOING ON IN THE WORLD OF BEES

Seasonal conditions

In Brown County, Wisconsin Average low temperature - 55 Average high - 66. Average Precipitation – 3.9 inches. Average Snow – 0 inches

In the hive

 June and July are the months of maximum population in the colony. Depending on your area and management style, the population will vary. Most estimates are in the range of 40-60,000 but some go up to seven digits. The colony, if big enough, continues to rear drones.
 Swarm season also continues in June. The Varroa mite population continues to build.

Inspection

- Colony inspections should take place at least once a month and include evaluating the brood
 pattern, confirming the presence of the queen and/or eggs, evaluating colony growth and available
 room, monitoring for pests and diseases, and other metrics.
- If you cannot inspect every one of your colonies, inspect the colonies that are not showing as much activity on the outside.
- If you install a package or nuc, allow two weeks for the colony to establish before you inspect it.

Nutrition

- Feed package bees or nucs upon their arrival.
- Provide supers if the brood chambers are full and the population/stores growing.

Pests, parasites, and diseases

- Monitor Varroa mite levels. At this point in the year, if you find two or more mites (per 100 bees) from a sugar shake, ether roll, or alcohol wash, you will want to treat. Treatment methods will depend on your management goals, the condition of the colony, and external conditions.
- Drone comb can be an effective cultural method at this time of year.
- This may be a good time to break the brood cycle (and therefore the Varroa reproduction cycle) by caging the gueen or performing splits.

Population management

- Swarm control: see the guidelines for May.
- This is the best time (swarm season) to rear queens.

Equipment

- Foundation will be more likely to be drawn out during a honey flow.
- Consider adding a queen excluder to manage the honey supers more easily.
- Set up bait hives if you want to catch a swarm!

Hive products and services

- Depending on the strength/size of your colonies and your management goals, you may consider extracting the spring honey. Extract immediately after removing the supers to prevent a small hive beetle infestation.
- You may be able to trap pollen.

Yard maintenance

Mow the yard as necessary.

Club Education Reimbursement Opportunity

Club & Bee Keeping History

BCBA Club History - 1970's: Special history noted in red!

- 1970 Joe Arvey is joined by his wife in the club
- Floyd Burchell displayed a chart on bee anatomy and life to be used when giving talks club is considering purchasing
- Club is discussing was to increase membership and promote honey
 - o suggestion to hold meeting in a bigger space such as the court house annex ended up meeting at the regular spot YMCA
 - o move meetings to members homes
- Meeting attendance remains low 4-6
- Christmas party well attended with 22 members and guests
- December 1970 Joe Arvey set up a checking account for the club 2 signatures required president and treasurer
- 2 club members had a net honey crop of 354 pounds and donated the proceeds to the club
- Bee and honey promotion was becoming more of a thing many requests were coming to the club from schools and garden clubs
- 1971 membership drive to help increase membership and attendance 16 pd members
- Suggestion made to buy charts Floyd Burchell showed at an earlier meeting life and history of honey bees, wild bees and honey bees idea tabled for now
- Continue making donations to the YMCA
- March 11, **1971** Clarence Pfluger brought old documents from club years of documentation and the members went through and sorted everything. They only kept the most valuable ones he donated a file for all of the valuable items
- June 20, 1971 Tom Cashman Jr arrives on the scene accompanying his father to the annual summer picnic
- January 1972 Tom Cashman Jr becomes the Club Secretary
- Christmas gift exchange limit increased to \$1. 28 members and guests in attendance
- 1974 throughout the years there were a good number of memberships that were couples
- Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Duffy joined the club
- No funding to continue the State inspector
- Suggested that the club pool orders for bees for everyone in the BCBA
- Annual summer picnic everyone was encouraged to bring something to be auctioned off and the \$
 would go to the club
- October 3, 1974 Tom Cashman Sr died \$10 flowers sent from Club
- It was decided that individual counties would set up their own zoning and ordinances
- 1975 Map committee still working to get members to mark their hive locations
- 1976 unable to get a booth at the Brown County Fair
- Raymond Duffy President
- Meetings now moved to alternate locations from the YMCA to Northeast Wisconsin Technical Institute and East De Pere High School
- Membership dues raised from \$1 to \$2

• 1977 club initiative to get representation from 4H in the fair booth to help explain bee culture and answer bee questions – worked with Larry Schneider the Ag teacher at

E. De Pere HS

- Working on getting an observation hive for the booth
- Club was asked for donations by members so the club could donate to Wisconsin Honey Producers Association (WHPA)
- Club continues to send delegates representing BCBA at the state convention
- **1977** Lots of planning continued
 - o Booths at State Fair and the Brown County Fairs honey recipe books and honey and comb honey sales advertisement and fundraising
 - WHPA annual meeting
 - Summer picnic and Christmas Party
 - State inspections
 - Bee Legislation
 - Mapping County hives to help prevent crowding started in 1975
 - Honey sales and wax ornaments
- 1978 Bruce Rumage from Arkansas joins the club
- Club continues to search for ways yo improve meeting attendance
- May **1978** President Raymond Duffy tries to resign due to an accident, but his resignation is rejected by club members
- October **1978** Club discussion on Cyno gas used to kill bees people often killed their bees once winter came and they bought new bees in the spring. Packaged bees were inexpensive
- Paul Hartman, Horticulturist from UW extension provided guidance throughout the year and was invited to the Christmas party. He was given a gift in appreciation for his involvement with the club
- Members who traveled to other areas and visited apiaries sometimes presented slide shows at the meetings
- **1979** New Business
 - o Suggested that BCBA apply to have the WHPA State Convention in Green Bay in 1979 or 1980
 - Increase dues
 - Increase meetings from Every other month to every month
 - o Rumage suggested club hold an auction of old bee equipment and the money would go to the association
- February **1979** club decided to move forward with application to hold WHPA State Convention in GB at the Downtowner Hotel
- Dues were increased to \$5/ individual and \$7.50 for family (which includes spouse and children under age 18)
- 1 year free membership for youth until age 18
- <u>March 1979</u> "Quarrel broke out between Tom Cashman and Floyd Burchell State Association Badger Bee Editor. Bruchell demanded BCBA Secretary must report every detail @ BCBA meetings to Badger Bee Editor"
 - o <u>Motion made that BCBA Secretary will soley make the decision what to report to Badger</u> <u>Bee</u>
- Suggestion to form a coop to give members a commercial rate when buying equipment and supplies lots of discussion and other clubs that tried it did not recommend it
- Club Newsletter was born April 1979 this was a place that club members could express opinions freely. The majority of the club was in favor of the newsletter.

- June **1979** Bruce Rumage elected President
- Rumage started glass hive box.. nothing else written about it
- Pesticide committee was formed to look at spraying crops/ canning factories
- Port Plaza Mall to allow club to promote honey and a suggestion was made to sell honey at the farmers market
- Reported that some honey from China was found to have chunks of metal in it
- Questions arose as to why Brown County does not have a Honey Queen
- Interestingly enough, Dadant & Sons asked for volunteers to work the honey booth at the state fair on Saturday am and nobody volunteered
- Raymond Duffy suggested that all county associations write up the history of their association No such documentation found on BCBA
