PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope you had an enjoyable holiday and with the new year it is time to look forward to a new beekeeping season. With the start of the new year, now is a good time to set some goals for your hives. Begin by reviewing last year and ask yourself: what did I do well, what did I do somewhat well and what do I need to improve upon with my beekeeping. Those thoughts should inspire some goals for this year. Don't be afraid to step outside your comfort zone and try something new. The reward might be huge for you.

The next step is an action plan for each of your goals. Winter allows plenty of time to research for your goals and create an action plan. Take time to read some books, cruise the internet, and talk to some fellow beekeepers on what you want to accomplish. Now that you have your plan established, create a timeline of the plan's task on a calendar, while keeping in mind the bee's calendar. For example, to get ready for swarm season, you need to have your equipment ready prior to the bees building up their numbers in April and May. Or if you are splitting hives have your boxes and frames built/bought prior to splitting. Another example would be mite testing, treatments and applications schedules, before the mites become a problem.

Those task items, especially supplies are a good thing to try to accomplish in February and March, before the full start of the beekeeping season.

Also, don't forget to check in on the girls once a month to make sure they are doing well.

The new and old leadership team met in December and did the exact same goal/planning process for the club. At the January club meeting, hopefully you will be as excited as we are to see what we have planned for 2024.

January Management Info

Seasonal conditions (weatherspark.com)

In Brown County, Wisconsin

Average Temperatures: High: 26F Low: 11F

Average Precipitation: 5.1 inches (4.6 inches of snow, 0.5 inches of rain)

Average Hours of Sunlight per Day: 9 hr 18 min

In the hive:

The bees are in their winter cluster, except for very warm and sunny days (roughly 50°F and above), when they might leave the hive for a cleansing flight. Queens may lay a few eggs, in which case the cluster will need to keep the brood warm. Dead bees may pile up on the bottom board; on warm days, the bees may remove the bodies, and other bees may fly off to die. Dead bees scattered on the snow outside the hive are therefore a good sign.

Nutrition

Check if the colony is light on food stores (you can tell by gently hefting the hive). If so, add dry sugar, fondant, or a candy board on a warmer day.

Equipment

- Order any replacement bees (packages, nucs, or queens) as soon as possible; producers generally run out fast.
- Check any stored equipment for pests such as wax moths.
- Take inventory. Fix, clean/sterilize, purchase, assemble, and paint equipment as needed.
