PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The weather is telling us winter is right around the corner and very few nice days are left for the season. The bees will utilize those nice days to find what ever food is available to them. As beekeepers we need to keep in mind that any feeding of syrup needs to be dried down by the bees, which adds moisture to the hive. Moisture can be detrimental to the hive. As a general rule, when the temperature gets around 50 degrees and the bees start to cluster, it is time to stop syrup feeding.

November is also the time most beekeepers think about winterizing and wrapping their hives. To wrap or not to wrap is the question. Again the 50 degrees temperature is the key, or should I say 40 degrees - 50 degrees it the clustering temperature for the bees. When bees cluster, there is less movement and they are just generating heat to keep the hive warm which saves food stores. As the temperature drops below 50 degrees the more heat they need to generate. So, they use more food stores. That balance between heat and food stores, according to some research, seems to be 40 degrees.

Getting back to wrapping. If we wrap too early, the bees will continue to be active and not clustering. Flying uses a lot of energy which equals more used food stores. Wrapping to late, the bees are using more food stores to keep the hive warm. That is the art of beekeeping answering the question of when to wrap and if needed add sugar to supplement the hives.

Also, don't forget to take advantage of any warm days when the bees are flying to do another oxalic vapor treatment. The hives are basically brood less and mite levels are on the down swing. So hit those mites again.

November Management Info

Seasonal conditions

- In Brown County, Wisconsin
- Average Temperatures: High: 37F Low: 25F
- Average Precipitation: 3.6 inches (1.9 inches of snow, 1.7 inches of rain)
- Average Hours of Sunlight per Day: 9 hours 39 minutes

In the Hive

The bees are in their winter cluster and there is little to no egg laying in November.

Equipment

- You may insulate the hive, but be sure foremost to avoid moisture build-up in the hives. Cold is less of a problem for bees than condensation. Since much of the heat escapes out of the top of the hive, some beekeepers add a super with an insulating, absorbent material (e.g., dry leaves, wood chips). Others wrap the hives in black tar paper or similar materials.
- Leave an upper entrance open for the exhaust of moisture. Tilt the hives forward a few degrees so that any moisture that does accumulate can drain out the bottom entrance.
- Be sure that any equipment you are storing during the winter that may harbor wax moths has been frozen and/or is stored carefully.

Yard Maintenance

- Consider setting up a wind break near the hives.
- If it snows, make sure the entrances are clear of snow to ensure proper air flow.
