PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

September to me seems to be the busiest month of the year for a beekeeper. Honey harvest and processing. Mite treatments. Feeding and building up stores for the winter. Setting up your hive configurations and components for winter.

Hopefully your honey harvest was fruitful. Remember to enter some of fruits of your labor in the club's honey judging contest at the November meeting. Maybe you will win a ribbon for some bragging rights.

Mite management should be a cornerstone for successful overwintering of your bees. The queen is laying eggs for winter bees and those bees do not need stressors from the mites or the viruses they carry. Focus on getting those mite levels as low as possible. Make sure you are monitoring the efficacy of your treatment of choice. Mite treatment isn't a one and done process. Also, vary your treatment chemicals as you don't want those mites to develop a resistance to your preferred treatment.

Monitor what the hive has for stores and if the weight is low supplement with feeding. I noticed this Fall's nectar flow was almost nonexistent. Goldenrod flow is providing some relief to the low weights, but I think hives are still stressed. My reasoning is that I have seen an increase in hive beetles in some of my hives. An indication that something is not quite right with the hive.

Not to add another job to the to do list, but gathering and setting up hive components for the winter. However you choose to winter your bees, now is the time to start digging those items out of the garage or shed to make sure you have what you need. Don't forget to take those queen excluders off.



TRIBUTE TO TOM CASHMAN

In Memory of Tom Cashman 🐳
A Beekeeper Who Carried on a Tradition

The Brown County Beekeepers Association is deeply saddened by the passing of longtime member and friend, *Tom Cashman*, who devoted more than 50 years of his life to our association and to the craft of beekeeping.

Carrying on a Family Legacy 🇞

In 1934, Tom's father, *Thomas Cashman Sr.*, served as President of the Brown County Beekeepers Association. Nearly four decades later, Tom Jr. joined the club in 1971, beginning a half-century of service that would shape the future of the organization. For 102 years our club has stood, and for 75 of those years there has been a Cashman at its heart.

Guiding the Club Through Growth 📈

Tom became an officer almost immediately after joining, serving faithfully as treasurer and leader *every year since 1972*. Under his watchful care, the club grew from a small circle of *28 members to over 125 today*. His steady hand helped guide us through changing times, keeping alive the values of education, stewardship, and community that define our association.

Tom often reflected on the growth of public awareness about honey bees and their critical role as pollinators. * He took pride in the club's expanding efforts to **educate both members and the public**—a legacy that will continue to blossom thanks to his dedication.

A Humble Steward, a Lasting Inspiration 🙏

Tom never sought the spotlight, but his presence was constant and essential. Whether managing club affairs, mentoring new beekeepers, or sharing insights from decades at the hive , Tom embodied the spirit of service. His contributions, like the bees he cared for, worked quietly but tirelessly to strengthen the whole.

Our Tribute 🌟

We honor Tom not only for his remarkable 50 years of membership and leadership but also for his role in carrying forward a tradition begun by his father nearly a century ago. Few families have given so much to one organization, and few individuals have left such a lasting imprint.



Tom Cashman Jr. in the late 70's versary as a member. The Brown County Beekeepers Association of Green Bay, WI was organized in 1918 and has been active in the community ever since. Articles in the Green Bay Press-Gazette from the 1930s indicate numerous Wisconsin state bee conventions were held in Green Bay. In 1934, C.P. Dadant, the second-generation owner of Dadant and Sons, was a speaker at the convention.

September Honeybee Management Guide for Northeast Wisconsin

∮ September Beekeeping Tips – Northeast Wisconsin

1. Winter Bee Production

September bees are your winter cluster! Ensure queens are still laying a healthy brood pattern and that colonies are strong enough to raise well-fed winter bees.

2. Varroa Management - Last Call

By now, mite treatments should be completed. Verify mite loads are low (<2%) using an alcohol wash or sugar roll. High mite counts in September almost guarantee winter losses.

3. Feeding & Stores

- Target: 60-80 lbs of honey or syrup per hive going into October.
- If light, feed 2:1 sugar syrup consistently until stores are adequate.
- Consider feeding pollen substitute if natural pollen is scarce, but avoid overstimulating brood rearing late in the month.

4. Hive Configuration

- Remove any remaining empty supers—leave only boxes the bees can fill and defend.
- Reduce entrances or install mouse guards to prevnt intruders as nights cool.

5. Disease & Health Check

- Watch for signs of European Foulbrood, Nosema, and chalkbrood.
- Cull or combine weak colonies—better to strengthen a few than lose many over winter.

6. Equipment & Winter Prep

- Begin setting up moisture quilts, inner covers, and insulation wraps for October installation.
- Repair or replace damaged boxes now so hives are weather-tight before frost.

7. Beekeeper's September Checklist

- ✓ Confirm queen status & brood pattern
- ✓ Final mite check & treatment (if needed)
- ✓ Feed until hives are heavy with stores
- Remove empty supers
- ✓ Add entrance reducers & mouse guards
- Prep winter equipment



Twice Baked Honey Cakes

These twice baked honey cakes are simple and flavorful cakes for any special occasion.



Recipe Corner – Twice Baked Honey Cakes

A simple, flavorful treat for any occasion!

Ingredients (makes 12 cakes):

1 3/4 cups flour

1½ tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

½ cup butter (plus extra for greasing)

Zest of 1 lemon

¼ tsp nutmeg

34 cup milk

2 eggs

1 tsp vanilla

1 cup honey (¾ cup in batter + ¼ cup for glaze)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F and butter muffin pan.

Mix dry ingredients; cut in butter.

Whisk milk, eggs, honey, and vanilla; combine with dry mixture.

Fill 12 muffin wells and bake ~16 min.

Remove, brush with warm honey, then bake 8-10 min more until golden.

Cool & enjoy!
